Run Balmoral 2025 was another great success with 4299 runners taking part out of an overall entry of 5126, representing an 84% turnout, which is excellent. We were also treated to some wonderful individual performances with four course records being broken. Sean Chalmers enjoyed a double success with wins in the Harbour Energy 5k and the Stena Drilling 10k, while it was amazing to watch Millie Glass Park smashing her own record in the MPH Primary School Girls' 1.5k, while Nathan Lawson set a new standard in the RAM Tubulars Secondary School Boys' 2.5k. These are outstanding athletes, but we admire each and every one of the runners who participated in the series of races over the weekend. They are all winners.

Everyone who completed one of the races was rewarded by receiving the fifth in a series of specially designed medals featuring well-known landmarks in and around the estate. Previous medals have shown Lochnagar, Balmoral Castle, Albert's Cairn and Crathie Kirk. This year's medal showcased the Auld Brig O'Dee. Devil of Deeside participants received an additional special 'Devil' medal. Now we are turning our thoughts to a new series of medals, beginning in 2026, and details will be revealed soon.

Every year we aim to improve our sustainability objectives and in 2025 we decided to contribute to one of the biggest nature restoration projects undertaken in the Cairngorms. The River Dee Trust conservation charity has committed to planting a million native trees along the riverbank between now and 2035 as part of a massive scheme to help protect Atlantic salmon and other wildlife in and around the River Dee and its tributaries. So, instead of providing t-shirts to competitors, Run Balmoral decided to contribute one new native tree for every runner who signed up to take part in our races. #### **Course Records**

Based on gun times (other than Devil of Deeside which is based on chip times)

Scotland international Sean Chalmers led the way with a couple of sparkling new records in the Harbour Energy 5k and the Stena Drilling 10k while youngsters Nathan Lawson, in the RAM Tubulars 2.5k, and Millie Glass Park, in the MPH 1.5k, also set new standards.

As the Bilfinger 6 Mile Trail Race was being held for the first time, the respective men's and women's winners have established inaugural course records. There are also new records in the John Clark Motor Group Devil of Deeside Challenge as this competition took on a new format this year, with the Bilfinger 6 Mile Trail Race replacing the duathlon.

#### **Aberdeenshire Active Schools Awards 2025**

To encourage participation in the Balmoral races, Aberdeenshire Active Schools present trophies to the schools achieving the largest number of entrants. There are three categories of prizes and this year Aboyne Academy regained the secondary schools trophy after losing out in 2024 to eight-time previous winners Banchory Academy.

Banchory regained the 'large' (i.e. roll of 100 or more) primary schools award for the ninth time in 10 years, while Tarland's domination of the 'small' schools competition was extended to a sixth year. 2025

The trophies were presented by Stuart Grant, Active Schools and Community Sports Manager with Aberdeenshire Council, and Malcolm MacIntyre, who is deputy head at Aboyne Academy and a volunteer with Active Schools.

#### **Design Competition**

Although we chose not to have t-shirts this year, we continued to hold a design competition and youngsters were invited to create a front cover for the Event Programme and Information Leaflet. The winner was Karley Paterson, a pupil at Cove Bay's Charleston primary in Aberdeen. Karley was also successful in 2024 when she designed the t-shirt for the MPH Primary Schools 1.5k. This year, her imaginative design portrayed a stag with race medals hanging from its antlers, set against the backdrop of Balmoral Castle. Karley is also an excellent young athlete and finished second in the MPH primary schools 1.5k race.

In addition to her individual £50 prize, Karley earned another £100 which she chose to donate to a local charity, BB14. BB14 was set up in memory of Cove teenager Ben Bradford, who, sadly, passed away in his sleep last year. Ben was a keen footballer, and the charity aims to support families and their children by offering free sports and recreation services that they may not be able to afford on their own. It is also supporting fundraising towards a community sports campus in Cove.

The standard of entry was so high that we decided to recognise a number of other submissions at both secondary and primary school levels. The secondary school runners-up were Zac Smith and Kasey Carter, both from Hazlehead Academy. The primary school runners-up were Poppy Chalmers (Balmedie) and Zoe Budd (Tarland).

#### **MPH** Primary Schools 1.5k

The MPH primary schools 1.5k races are among the most popular of the weekend. This year was no different, with more than 800 youngsters unleashing a torrent of energy and enthusiasm as they sprinted off after enjoying a great warm-up routine led by the Friskis & Svettis Swedish exercise team. Their journey took them past Balmoral Castle, before sweeping round the edge of the vegetable garden, Queen Mary's Garden and the new maze, before heading back to the finish line where they were given a boisterous welcome from the large gathering of spectators.

Scottish under-13 cross country champion Millie Glass Park produced an outstanding performance when smashing her own course record in the girls' race. The Dunecht School pupil, who represents Young Meldrum Runners, knocked 14secs off the previous mark she set 12 months earlier to take top spot in 5min 31sec. Her time was so impressive, being 11secs quicker than the winning time in the boys' race. She finished 22secs ahead of Charleston School pupil Karley Paterson (Aberdeen AAC), while Banchory's Emily Birnie took third spot in 6:16. Karley was also the winner of our programme front cover design competition.

Aidan Gordon, a member of Banchory Stonehaven AC, showed fine form to win the boys' race over the same course. The Drumoak pupil clocked 5min 42sec to finish eight secs ahead of Old Rayne's Lawson Bowie (Young Meldrum Runners) with Banchory's Archie Aitken taking third position in 5:53.

It will be interesting to follow the progress of these youngsters in the future. Run Balmoral provides them with a wonderful opportunity to run in front of a big and enthusiastic crowd of family and friends in a spectacular setting, an experience which is often the springboard to a lifelong love for running and sport in general. When looking back through the results of previous years, we can see many names which now appear in our adult races. Some budding stars of the future potentially take their first competitive steps at Run Balmoral. The 2025 Stena Drilling 10k women's champion, Louise McKenzie, revealed she ran in the primary schools race many years ago and admitted that she didn't finish anywhere near the front. That's an important point to bear in mind. While it's fantastic to see the fast runners doing well, the most important thing is that everyone taking part enjoys the occasion and is inspired to run in other events in the future.

#### **RAM Tubulars** Secondary Schools 2.5k

Nathan Lawson, from Netherley near Stonehaven, retained his title in the RAM Tubulars secondary schools 2.5k, but went a step further by breaking the 12-year-old course record. The Albyn student clocked 6 min 55sec to slice three secs off the previous best set by East Sutherland athlete Liam Barnsby in 2013. Shortly afterwards he dusted himself down, lined up with senior athletes in a field of 1077 in the Harbour Energy 5k, and finished a very creditable sixth in 16:10. Lawson's Albyn team-mate Blair Blackwood, from Aberdeen, was second in the 2.5k, with a time of 7:28, while another Aberdeen athlete, Struan Mackay (Hazlehead Academy), who was runner-up in 2023, took third position in 7:31.

Falkirk's Emily Christie, who had been runner-up for each of the previous two years, secured top spot on the rostrum in the girls' race, finishing two secs ahead of Aberdeen AAC's Rachel Fitzpatrick (Hazlehead Academy) in 8:12, while Braemar's Eilidh Murdoch (Aboyne Academy), the primary schools champion in 2023, was third in 8:30. Christie, who went on to finish third in the Bilfinger 6 Mile Trail Race, is one of the many runners who regularly return to Run Balmoral. In addition to her three podium positions in the 2.5k, the Scottish Schools cross country international's honours list includes a win in the 2022 primary schools 1.5k, while last year she won the Bristow 3 Mile Trail Race.

Lawson and Christie join an illustrious list of past winners of the secondary schools races who have gone on to represent their country, the best known being Great Britain internationals Robbie Simpson and Naomi Lang.

The runners in the 1.5k and the 2.5k were delighted to be taken through their warm-up routines by Aberdeen FC mascot, Robbie the Ram, who proved to be very popular.

It was encouraging to note that the number of entries for the 2.5k was the highest since 2018, but we are keen to see this event continue to develop.

#### **Harbour Energy** 5k

Scotland international Sean Chalmers turned up for the Harbour Energy 5k determined to add to his two previous wins, in 2022 and 2024, but also had his eye on the course record of 14min 20sec set by Central AC's Jamie Crowe in 2023.

Conditions were ideal for fast running as a field of 1077 participants lined up under partially cloudy skies. The Aberdeen AAC man seized the opportunity and within the opening 400m he had opened a significant gap on his challengers. From that point on the only question on everyone's lips was, how fast could he go?

They didn't have to wait long for an answer as Chalmers powered his way round the circuit in impressive style before sprinting for the finishing line as the clock ticked away. It was touch and go, and there were a few moments of uncertainty before the official time of 14min 18secs popped up to confirm he had snatched the record by two seconds.


He said: "I wasn't sure if I'd got it when I finished, but I was relieved when it was announced. My plan was to go out hard then see how I felt going up the small hill after the turn, at about 1.5k. Then, I just kept the pace going. I was a bit nervous that I'd maybe just missed it, so it was good to get it confirmed. It was tough being out on my own, but I think some of the other guys were holding back, conserving their energy because they were doing the Devil of Deeside and had another three races to think about."

Chalmers was followed home by Metro Aberdeen's Fraser MacKenzie, who clocked 15:24, while Aaron Odentz (Aberdeen AAC), who would go on to win the Devil competition, was third in 15:29.

Aberdeen AAC's Nathan Lawson, who a little more than 90mins earlier had set a record time in the RAM Tubulars 2.5k, finished sixth overall in 16:10. Fulham's Stuart Macdougall won the over-40's title in 17:05 while Michael Hoult (Ross County AC) was first over-50 in 18:14. Richard Holland (Metro Aberdeen) won the over-60's title in 19:08 and his clubmate John Geddes was top over-70 in 28:01.

Fiona Brian won the women's 5k title exactly 10 years after winning the 10k. The Metro Aberdeen runner, who was third in the 5k 12 months earlier, clocked 17:25 to finish 23secs ahead of title-holder and three-time previous champion Jenny Bannerman (Inverness Harriers). Brian said: "My main aim was to be faster than last year, and I did it by about one minute, so I'm happy with that. I was in a group of four for the first 1.5k then gradually pulled away and basically kept going, never looking back." Debbie Greig (Alford Bull Running Club), the eventual women's Devil champion, took third position in 18:17.

Metro Aberdeen's Nicola Gauld, 10k champion in 2013 and 2017, was first in the over-40 age division when finishing fourth overall in 18:51. Aberdeen AAC's Hania Czebreszuk led the way in the under-20's with a time of 19:46, while Hilary Cameron (Forres Harriers) was first over-50 (20:20). Westhill's Ailsa Webster was top over-60 in 22:21 and Metro Aberdeen's Lana Hadden was best of the over-70's in 28:39.



#### Stena Drilling 10k

Sean Chalmers completed a stunning record-breaking double with a remarkable performance in the Stena Drilling 10k. He barely had time to cool down and recharge after winning the Harbour Energy 5k before getting ready for the 10k and its notoriously long, and agonisingly steep hill leading up to the halfway point. But there were no obvious signs of fatigue as Chalmers once again stormed clear of his rivals before powering home in 30min 54secs to scythe a whopping 23secs off the previous record set 12 years earlier by Great Britain mountain running international Robbie Simpson (Deeside Runners).

Chalmers said: "I am absolutely delighted, over the moon in fact. I came here hoping to get one course record but didn't believe I could get two. It was touch and go in the 5k and I wasn't sure if I'd got it when I finished. As for the 10k, well, Robbie is a very established runner and I knew it would be a tricky record to get, especially as it had survived for so long. It was a bit tough going up the hill and I felt it, but I just let myself go on the downhill. I got to 8k and thought if I could just maintain 3min per kilometre pace I could get it. So that's what I did and was able to bring it home.

"Run Balmoral is an amazing event, the atmosphere is unbelievable, with so many folk out and about. There's a real family feel about it and I'll definitely be back again."

Chalmers' 2025 double success brings his tally of Run Balmoral race victories up to six over the past three years. In 2024 he won the 5k, 10k and 15 mile races, while he also won the 5k in 2022.

Aaron Odentz, who would go on to win the John Clark Motor Group Devil of Deeside Challenge in which competitors tackled all four adult races over the weekend, finished second in 33:36, while 2016 and 2022 race winner Will Mackay (Metro Aberdeen) took third spot in 35:19.

Christopher Charles (Metro Aberdeen) was first under-20 when finishing 11th overall in 36:55 while Stuart Macdougall (Fulham) lifted the over-40's crown in 36:16, Aberdeen's Adrian Miles led the way in the over-50's in 38:16, Richard Roulson (Metro Aberdeen) was top over-60 in 41:21, and Frank Ovens headed the over-70's ratings in 55:07.

Louise McKenzie, from Cornill in Aberdeenshire, admits she surprised herself by sprinting to victory in a thrilling ending to the women's division of the race. The 25-year-old, who was fifth in 2024, produced a strong finish to overhaul Metro Aberdeen's Nicola Macdonald yards from the end to win by four secs in 38:39, while Robyn Pinder (Metro Aberdeen) was third in 39:04.

McKenzie said: "I'm amazed by my time because when I ran here last year I did well over 43minutes. I thought I'd be faster this year, but only by about two minutes. I didn't expect to be this quick. I've been doing quite a few 10ks and a half marathon, and I think that has helped me improve. I was focussing on getting a place on the podium and I think that kept me going as I had other girls with me for much of the way. I pulled away from one of them with about 1.5k to go, then I caught the other one just before the finish. I thought there was no way I was going to catch her, but just decided I'd try to go as fast as I could. Then I realised I was closing on her, so I started sprinting. I didn't think I could keep it going, but surprised myself and just managed to do it. It was a great feeling."

Huntly's Annabelle Meddler (British Nordic Development Squad) was first under-20 in 52:49 while Aberdeen's Genieve Brennan won the over-40's category in 43:13, Louise Kelly (Stonehaven Running Club) was first over-60 in 50:44 and Aboyne's Day Campbell was the over-70's winner in 1:15:18.

Paul Burnett, from Newmachar in Aberdeenshire, won the prize for the first kilted runner to complete the route, recording 40:54. For the second year in a row, Stonehaven's Helen Drewery was first kilted woman in 51:54 and she won the over-50's prize as well. Drewery had earlier completed the Harbour Energy 5k in 23:08 and would go on to complete the John Clark Devil of Deeside Challenge, winning the women's over-50 age group prize with a combined time of 4:37:46.



TAQA upset the favourites to win the Corporate Team Challenge title, and will take possession of the magnificent red deer antler and sycamore wood trophy for the next 12 months.



#### **Bilfinger** 6 Mile Trail Race

Aaron Odentz took top spot in the inaugural Bilfinger 6 Mile Trail Race on his way to securing the John Clark Motor Group Devil of Deeside title - but the Aberdeen AAC runner revealed he came very close to missing the run altogether. He said: "I misread the instructions and thought it started an hour later than it actually did. That would have been a disaster. I arrived late and never got a proper warm-up, but it turned out to be fine. It could have been worse. So, I started off steadily and after getting an early lead I was able to relax a little and conserve some energy for the 15 mile race. I enjoyed the course, especially with the two laps."

The race was being held for the first time and attracted a capacity field of 225 runners, but there's definitely scope to increase that in 2026. The route took competitors on an awesome run along the banks of the River Dee before climbing up through woodland paths, passing close to many of the famous Cairns on the Balmoral Estate. The two-lap course offered spectators an opportunity to cheer on the runners as they pass the halfway point.

Odentz won in 35min 20sec but behind him there was an almighty scrap for second position, with East Sutherland's Finlay Murray just getting the better of veteran Stuart Macdougall, finishing seven secs ahead in 37:27. As Macdougall was awarded the third-place prize, the over-40 award went to the fourth finisher, Steven Watters who recorded 40:05. Ross County's Michael Hoult collected his second over-50's title of the weekend with a time of 41:28, while Paul Mills of Deveron Harriers was the leading over-60 in 45:10.

Debbie Greig was an equally clear winner of the women's race in 40:27, which gave her fifth position overall from the 195 finishers. Moira Davie (Forres Harriers), a past winner of the 15- mile race, was runner-up in 41:34, while secondary schools 2.5k champion Emily Christie (Falkirk) finished third in 44:25. Brechin's Jessica Shepherd was first under-20 in 1:04:12, Banchory's Suzanne Matonti took the over-40's award in 50:35, Helen Drewery was over-50 champion in 56:16 and Ailsa Webster led the way in the over-60's in 51:05. Cherry Owens made the long journey from her home on the Isle of Wight worthwhile by winning the over-70's division in 1:24:14.

The prizes were presented by Bilfinger's Rod Agnew who completed the six-mile course in 53:51 having recorded 51:33 in the previous day's Stena Drilling 10k.

#### **Bristow** 15 Mile Trail Race

Ruairidh Gollan (East Sutherland) showed his class by winning the Bristow 15 Mile Trail Race in emphatic fashion. The 26-year-old professional musician hit all the right notes when blasting round the testing course in 1hr 25min 44sec, with Kyle Greig (Alford Bull RC) second in 1:27:47 and Aaron Odentz (Aberdeen AAC) third in 1:30:21.

Gollan said: "It's the first time I've been here and I really enjoyed the race. Kyle broke away after about five or six miles, but I had a bit more hill legs so I managed to get away from him on the climb to the highest point on the course. I was able to pull away after that but there was a sting in the tail with another tough hill near the end, however, I was able to keep my lead."





Runner-up Greig, who is the husband of women's race champion Debbie, had to settle for second position for the fourth time in the history of the race, having previously filled this position in 2018, 2019 and 2023. In the age groups, Elgin's Joseph Snitch was first under-20 in 2:15:58 while Stuart Macdougall (Fulham) led the way in the over-40's in 1:37:13 and Brian Bonnyman (Westerlands CCC), who was second overall in 2016, was first over-50 in 1:43:06. Tarland's Roger Dunridge won the over-60's prize in 1:58:45 and Fraserburgh's Graeme Clark was top over-70 in 2:51:02.

Debbie Greig (Alford Bull RC) was in a class of her own when winning the women's title in 1:45:04, which gave her seventh position overall from the field of 444 finishers. Aberdeen's Rachel Smith was second in 1:54:37 and Julie Scott (Insch Trail Running Club) took third position in 2:00:19. Edinburgh's Lucy Beeston was first under-20 in 2:32:06 while Aberdeenshire's Verity Smith 2:00:43 topped the rostrum in the over-40's. Metro Aberdeen's Tara Fairley won the over-50's division in 2:06:24 and Westhill's Ailsa Webster topped the over-60's field in 2:08:37.

#### John Clark Motor Group Devil of Deeside Challenge

Debbie Greig scored an emotional victory in the women's division of the John Clark Devil of Deeside competition. The Alford Bull Running Club member finished third in the 5k and fourth in the 10k on the opening day of the contest before winning the Bilfinger 6 Mile Trail Race and the Bristow 15 Mile Trail Race 24 hours later. That gave her a combined time of 3hr 24min 14secs which was bettered by just three men in a field of 101 finishers.

She said: "It's emotional because of the reason I'm here. Ten years ago I was training for an ironman triathlon and planned cycling out to race in the 5k and 10k at Balmoral, then cycle home as part of my training. But before leaving Aberdeen I was knocked off my bike and very seriously injured. I wanted to mark the 10th anniversary of that incident by coming out to Balmoral again and finding out how far I've come since that day.

"So, I couldn't be more proud of winning the Devil of Deeside. Running four races over a total of 30 miles in a little more than 24 hours sounds tough, but it was easy compared with what I went through a decade ago. I think I got the best out of myself this weekend and I'm very happy."

While most people would take plenty time off to recover from such an achievement, Greig was back out on the trails a week later when she won a 50k race in the Highlands.

Banchory-based Orkney' athlete Chelsea Cook took second position in 3:48:06, while over-60 age group competitor Ailsa Webster, from Westhill in Aberdeenshire, was third overall in 4:11:26. As Webster took the third place prize, the over-60 award went to Aviemore's Nicola Diggins with a time of 5:15:34. Banchory's Alesha Wood was first under-20 in 5:59:00 while Tarland's Claire Hannaford was first over-40 in 4:38:43. Helen Drewery completed a very successful weekend by winning the over-50 age title in 4:37:46, adding that to the age group awards she collected in the 10k and 6 mile races. She was also the 10k kilt champion.





#### John Clark Motor Group Devil of Deeside Challenge

Aberdeen AAC's Aaron Odentz collected the Devil of Deeside men's title with an equally impressive set of performances in the four races. After placing third in the 5k and second in the 10k, he went on to win the inaugural Bilfinger 6 Mile Trail Race before securing the Devil victory with a third-place finish in the 15 Mile Tail Race, giving him a combined time of 2:54:44.

Afterwards he said: "I'm really happy, but right now it feels very sore. I'm delighted because I've come back after a frustrating period of nine months of injury, so It's great to prove to myself that I can handle this volume of running. Of the four races, the 15 miler was by far the toughest. I'd never done it before and someone told me it wasn't too hilly, but I can tell you now, it is very hilly. But, I will definitely do it again and for sure I'll be back next year so long as I stay clear of injury and illness."

Stuart Macdougall (Fulham) who was competing at Run Balmoral for the first time since finishing eighth in the 10k in 2015, was runner-up in 3:08:03, while Finlay Murray (East Sutherland) finished third in 3:17:26. Ross County's Michael Hoult secured the over-50 title in 3:37:19 with Paul Mills (Deveron Harriers) taking the over-60's award in 3:51:04.

Banchory-based Steven Watters is the Marketing & Communications Manager for the Devil of Deeside sponsors, John Clark Motor Group, so it was appropriate that he should take part in the competition which his company supports. And, what a performance: Steven finished in fifth position for the second year in a row, posting a combined time of 3:28:20. He also collected the over-40 age group prize.

The new format for the gruelling competition, in which the duathlon was replaced by the Bilfinger 6 Mile Trail Race, appeared to go down well with 101 finishers, the highest number since 2018 and the second best since the event was first held in 2017.

It's interesting to note that there have now been different winners of the women's title on each of the seven occasions the competition has been held, but Aaron Odentz is just the third athlete to have won the men's award.


